Again this year, I enjoyed watching the time-honored "Christmas Carol" classic by Charles Dickens. This was the more-recent life-like animation version. It impressed me anew as I pondered the positive message of *New Life* it emphasized, seen in the newly-transformed "Christmassy" Scrooge—reflected in his warm and compassionate relationships towards one and all, most of all the poor Cratchit family. (11) For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. (12) And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. (13) And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, (14) "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." (Luke 2:10-14)

NOW, when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem, <sup>(2)</sup> Saying, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him." (Matthew 2:1-2)
